Insurance matters

Question: Is a volunteer is covered if they are driving, or as a passenger in a car of a committee member, and also if they are working offsite on behalf of the Show?

Answer: Volunteers are covered if working offsite and generally the vehicle registration would cover injuries that are caused during a motor vehicle accident.

Jumping Castles

If you engage an external service provider at your show who provides a Jumping Castle or similar, PLEASE CHECK THE FINE PRINT ON THEIR INSURANCE POLICY YOU RECEIVE FROM THEM. Many jumping castles cannot be insured. The jumping castle may come under another name on the policy however if it looks like a jumping castle, it probably is a jumping castle and may not be insured.

Queensland Ag Show Office Update

- ❖ Shows will have received an invoice for Affiliation Fees. The affiliation fees each Show pays is calculated at the current rate of \$55 per \$1000 of the gate take. This is the 4th year of this rate as the current Affiliation fee rate has been on hold for the previous 3 years due to COVID. Payment is due on 29th February.
- ❖ A reminder that Show Societies and Sub Chambers need to update all new contact details with Qld Ag Shows.
- ❖ The Annual Return will now be sent to your Show the week after your Show. This will need to be returned within 1 month. There will no longer be an Annual Return sent towards the end of the year. Please ensure that all information is accurate, not an estimate. You would have all information and figures on hand as you would usually have your report done after the Show. By doing this, we are able to gauge how shows are going, attendance figures, and any problems shows may be experiencing in real time.
- ❖ We have developed a "Secretaries Handbook". This is designed to help all committee members with information required to run their society. It will be available on our website or by contacting our office. This handbook will be updated periodically, and we welcome any suggestions from Shows for additions or corrections to the handbook.
- Share this newsletter with your Show Society members. It is for everyone, not just the Secretary.

Varroa Mite – prevent the spread of varroa mite in Queensland

This will be of interest to shows that hold bee product competitions.

Varroa Mite is one of the most serious pests of honey bees worldwide.

In June 2022, varroa mite (varroa destructor) was detected in NSW. Qld remains free of Varroa Mite.

From states where varroa mite has been found

You must hold a <u>biosecurity instrument permit</u> issued by the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries to move bees, beehives, used beekeeping equipment or bee products (including unprocessed honey) into Queensland from states or territories where varroa mite has been found.

Processed honey and processed beeswax.

You do not need a permit to move processed honey and processed beeswax into Queensland if:

- honey has been extracted, filtered, strained, or settled to remove wax cappings and dead bees.
- beeswax has undergone melting, filtering (to remove bees, brood, and debris) and a rendering treatment before being packed.
- it has been packed in a facility without bees.
- the outside of the container, and any frames, pallets and packaging are free from honey or beeswax.
- it is a quarantine-secured diagnostic honey sample for testing at a recognised diagnostic facility.

Australian native bees are not included in the restrictions.

Fire Ants



Fire Ants continues to be a major problem for South-East Qld and the Lockyer Valley areas. Fire ants are one of the world's most invasive pests.

Fire ants can restrict everyday activities such as sporting activities and outdoor play. Fire ants are very aggressive when their nests are disturbed. Stings can cause painful, burning, itching sensations lasting up to 1 hour. In severe cases stings can lead to anaphylaxis. Animals including the family pet and livestock can also be affected.

What does a fire ant look like?

- Copper brown in colour with a darker abdomen
- Quite small at 2-6 mm
- Found in a variety of sizes with the one nest.

How are they spread?

Fire ants are small and highly adaptive and can survive in a range of climates and conditions. They can

- Travel over and underground.
- Fly up to 5 km.
- Raft on waterways after floods or wet weather events
- Materials such as soil, hay, mulch, manure, quarry products, turf, and potted plants
- Containers that have been used with organic materials, such as potted plants.
- Dirty machinery that has been used to move restricted material.

What does a Fire Ant nest look like?

- Can appear as a dome-shaped mound or be flat and look like a small patch of disturbed soil.
- Are often found in open areas such as lawns and pastures and along roadsides and unused cropland. They can also be found next to or under other objects on the ground, such as timber, logs, rocks, pavers, or bricks.

Report them within 24 hours of sighting by calling 13 25 23 or you can complete the online form at www.fireants.org.au
The faster you report, the less chance there is of fire ants becoming a problem and spreading.

Fire Ants and our Shows

The movement of soil, hay, potted plants, and vehicles all play a part in the movement of fire ants and Shows need to be very aware of the dangers and processes and protocols which need to be put in place.

Qld Ag shows are currently meeting with the Department to discuss ways of dealing with the fire ant invasion and will work with them to document procedures and information for Shows. Any information we receive will be passed to Shows.
